- 75 participants

- Obstacles Identified key obstacles to digital inclusion
- Solutions- Proposed targeted strategies and projects
- Policy Plan- Advocacy plans to address key obstacles
- Action Plan key actions to promote Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander digital inclusion





Some key themes

- Remote Indigenous people remain the most digitally excluded population in Australia
- Digital inclusion should be considered a human right
- Major obstacles are affordability and access to infrastructure, equipment and online services; also cyber-safety, security and skills
- More mobile coverage and WiFi solutions needed due to mobility and limited home internet





Some key themes

- Locally relevant projects, content and applications are the key to engagement
- Partnerships and knowledge sharing are key enablers
- Digital mentors needed to increase skills and awareness; a new job in communities
- Devices are often shared, not individual
- Prepaid services are used more than billed, but expensive

- ARC project to set up Noongar Pedia- first Australian language 'pedia' site
- An online resource for Noongar place names, conceptual frames, country, narrative, music, popular culture, citizenship
- Noongar cultural knowledge needs to be conveyed across generationsonline delivery enables this

Yokai: Stolen Generations Information Service

Jim Morrison | Stolen Generations/ Bringing Them Home Wayne Bynder | Unna You Fullas





- Using online platforms to get relevant information to dispersed stolen generations people
- Re-connecting families via online network
- Cultural healing and connection is critical to our future
- Aiming to re-launch the *Unna* You Fellas radio show as an online radio service

To Skype or not to Skype- Remoteness and the Internet Barbara Bynder | Kardia Designs



- e-learning is great but requires good access and speed
- slow internet = no videocon
- Many people can't access online services in remote areas
- Some jobs require online application, restricts people without internet access

Unleashing the Potentials Leigh Harris, Ingeous Studios



- Promote jobs in IT for remote people and Indigenous business development
- Need to start with focus on digital inclusion using relevant creative, fun projects
- Educate Inspire Create
- Set up D.Hive and Unleash.D technical forum to be in Cairns

Broadband access and its potential applications for a WA Remote Indigenous Media Organisation Neil Turner and Tadam Lockyer, PAKAM



- Remote community TV started to maintain language and culture in response to satellite coming- 'Fighting Fire with Fire'
- Is NBN satellite a threat to culture or an enabler?
- Digital programs and skills create new employment pathways
- Need more IT training and technical support projects

Building Apps to use and share digitally-stored cultural information

Warren Smith, inyerpocket software Dora Dallwitz, Ara Irititja (by video)



- Appbooks is app-based content building tool
- No need to code, just drag and drop tools, updates immediately
- Ara Irititja using Appbooks- easy to use, customisable, colourful
- Great way to get young people generating content

The Life and Times of a mobile phone out bush Jennifer McFarland, CAYLUS



- Remote community stats: 26% under 16, 8% disabled, 12% under 4, 2% in jail, 3% aged, 19% carers, 24% looking after small kids, 6% may have jobs; 43% in unpaid jobs
- Mobiles highly valued, shared by multiple users
- Pre-paid data is very expensive
- Mobile phone snakes and ladders- lots of snakes, hardly any ladders
- AirG creates lots of trouble- bullying, jealousing, false identity, wrong way talk, violence; costs \$1/day

Telecommunications and remote Indigenous communities: now and into the future Kate Laffan, DPMC



- Remote Indigenous IT Activity providing WiFi enabled community phones and other WiFi projects, using NBN Public Internet Premises
- More action needed on digital literacy and empowerment
- Cyber-safety- working with esafety officer on Be Deadly online content
- Next stage focus on digital inclusion and literacy activities

How We Do It in Ranges: Wilurarra Creative Studio, music and Alanya Silvano Giordano



- Wilurarra is a youth arts project: video, music, fashion, photography, hairdressing, metalwork, internet café, WiFi
- Access to internet should be a basic human right
- Projects need community ownership and involvement to be sustainable
- Learning is self-motivated and peer supported

Impact of social media on our family Angela Voerman & Esiah Jones (by video in Utopia NT)



- Facebook is very important for connecting with family and friends when away from country
- If no credit to use phone, cant access Centrelink to report earnings, can lose payments'
- Mygov- People expected to read and write English
- Need to block AirG from the WiFi- causes too much trouble

Living and working in a remote community-A Ngaanyatjarra Perspective

Daisy O'Byrne | Ngaanyatjarra Media



- Ng Media supports media and IT training and projects in 14 remote Ngaanyatjarra communities (WA)
- Lived and worked through changes form HF radio as only form of communication to fibre rollout (2008) and mobile in 6 communities
- Children access internet and develop skills at telecentre (CRC)
- If connectivity fails in communityno money from ATM, no food

Real stories about healthcare from outstations

Wayne Beadell | Derby Aboriginal Health Service



- Aboriginal health practitioner for 6 communities in Kimberleys
- Difficulties in accessing telehealth records and services with unreliable internet services
- Pushing to get videoconferencing for remote consultations, saves high cost of patient flights (PATS)
- People prefer to stay in community, not leave to access medical services

Online studies for mature age students: A struggle

Valda Shannon | CDU researcher, Tennant Creek



- Nationally accredited interpreter and translator
- Doing Master of Education as researcher in Tennant Creek
- Wants to set up community study centre as nowhere to access computers outside of work hours
- Online is way to go for education and keeping languages alive
- We have knowledge but need digital skills

The Action Plan





Challenges facing Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people

- A dedicated Indigenous Digital Inclusion Strategy needed now
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Engagement in Decision Making
 - Community decision making re infrastructure programs
 - Local control over Internet service provision within community
 - Representation on Boards/ advisory groups
 - Indigenous Community Engagement positions in govt/ NBN/ telcos
- Education and Awareness
 - Cultural frameworks and protocols
 - Code of conduct for engaging with remote communities
 - Objective advice on opportunities and impacts

Affordability

- Address Barriers to Access Essential Services
 - Free access to essential online services (white list)
 - More affordable pre-paid mobile data products
 - Need alternate to credit card payments for online services/ sales
 - · Partnerships with large orgs (eg mining co's) for data sharing
- Local content servers enable affordable access to highuse content via WiFi
- Delivery of e-services saves government money
 - PATS tele-health savings should go back into community facilities
 - Expand telehealth Medicare numbers
 - Do Cost-benefit analysis of tele-health delivery

Access / Availability

- Maintain Telephony Services
 - Continuation of payphones in remote communities
 - Maintain existing voice services where no mobile coverage exists
 - Satellite is not adequate for delivering fundamental voice services
- A targeted Mobile Blackspot Program to focus on remote Indigenous Australia
- NBN Public Interest Premises Increase PIP data allowance (from 150GB/mth) to meet community usage needs
- Long-term Infrastructure Planning to address congestion in NBN satellite with terrestrial in-fill

Digital Inclusion

- Digital Inclusion is a human right
- Include digital inclusion as a 'closing the gap' indicator
- Data Collection needed to measure digital inclusion in remote and rural Australia
- IT Training and Technical Support Program (ongoing)
- Digital Mentors Employment Program
- Remote Cyber Safety Strategy
- Industry partnerships via RAPs / ILUAs etc
- Develop pathways towards inclusion in digital economy
