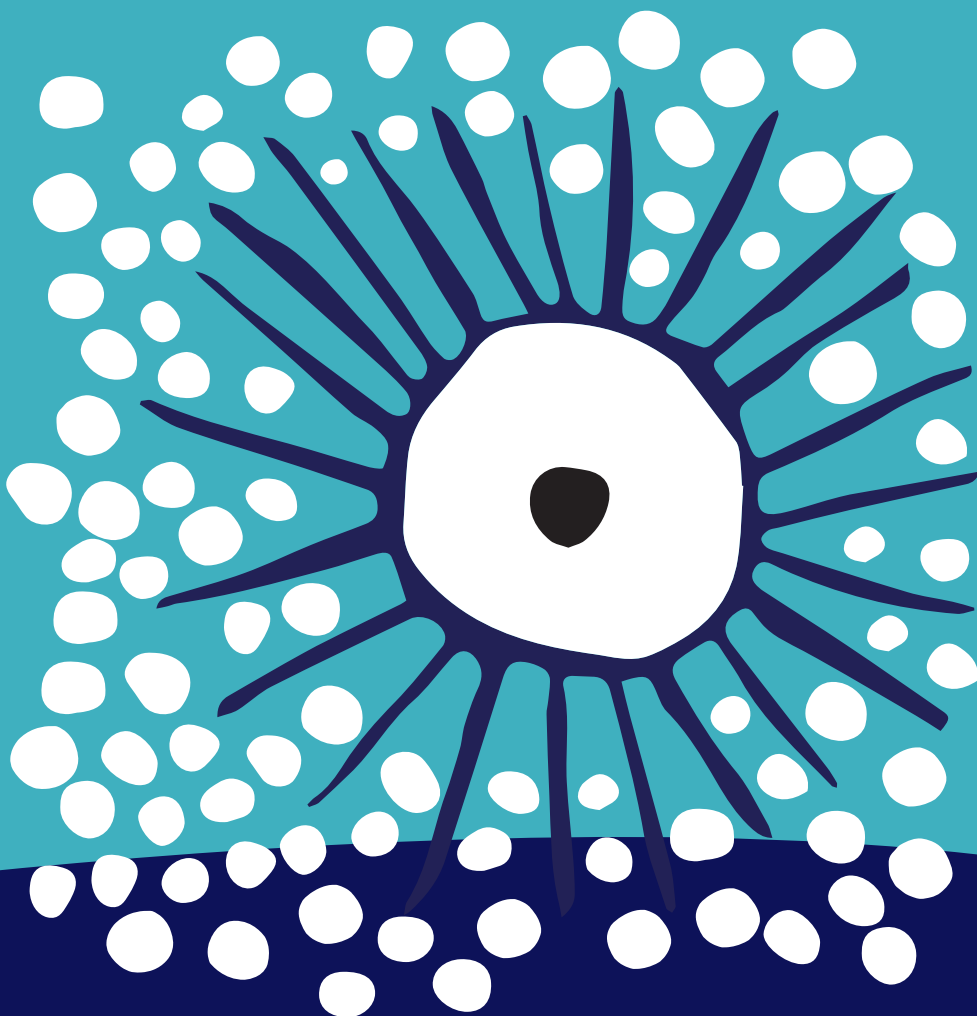

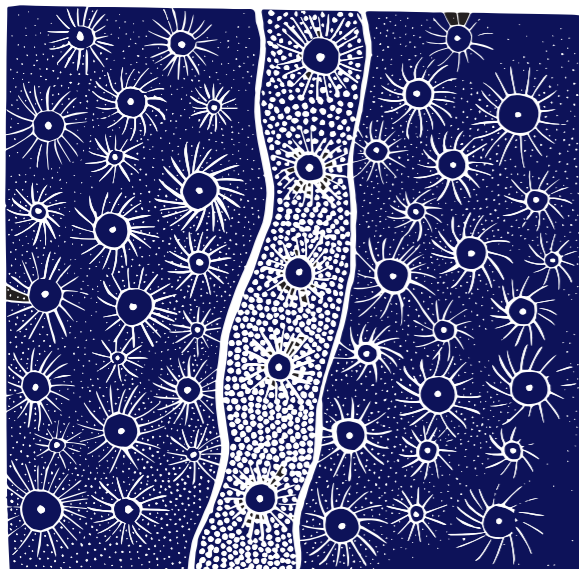

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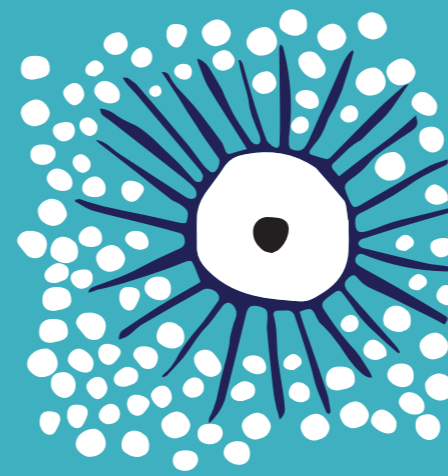

# about the festival

Each year the National Remote Indigenous Media Festival brings together community broadcasters and media producers from across remote Australia. A different RIMO (Remote Indigenous Media Organisation) hosts the Festival each year and with location alternating between coastal to desert communities. The Festival is a key part in the development of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander media practitioners and aims to strengthen the media industry in remote communities. It creates opportunities for trainees, practitioners and people interested in remote media from all regions to meet with industry stakeholders, share stories, grow their skills and receive recognition and encouragement for their work.

A highlight of the Festival is the Remote Media Awards Ceremony where individuals from RIMO networks and remote communities are recognised for their achievements and work keeping remote Indigenous media strong.

The 2016 Festival will be hosted by IRCA in partnership with TEABBA and the Yirrkala community.

For 5 days remote media workers and industry guests will descend on Arnhem Land for an exciting industry program with skills workshops, short courses, industry forums, video screenings, live radio coverage, music and cultural events.

Yirrkala is on the east coast of the Gove peninsula in north-east Arnhem Land, 18km south of Nhulunbuy, approximately 700km east of Darwin.



## WHAT & WHERE

The Festival delegates program will take place at the Festival Hub (located at the Church). The Opening Ceremony, the Outdoor Cinema, Closing Night Concert & BBQ will take place at the Dadaynga Stage.

## ACCOMMODATION Culture College

There is an on-site Accommodation Coordinator at the premises for your comfort. For security reasons, the keys will be held by the Accommodation Coordinator. When the shuttle bus departs the Culture College in the morning, the college will be locked by the Accommodation Coordinator.

When the shuttle arrives back in the evening the Culture College will be opened by the Accommodation Coordinator.

## Camping

At the Banana Farm on the edge of Yirrkala. Please note this is private property. There is one male and one female permanent toilet/showers onsite, as well as a shared kitchen and a washing machine. There is an additional shower and toilet amenities set up.

Valuables are your own responsibility. We advise that you keep your belongings with you at all times.

Please do not smoke in or around the Banana Farm under any circumstances. The grass in this area is highly flammable. Please smoke only in the designated area.

## TRANSPORT

If staying in the town of Nhulunbuy please note it is about a 20min drive from Yirrkala. If you are flying in and hiring a car, you do not require a permit to drive in the local main areas of Yirrkala and Nhulunbuy. Please conform to local protocols and ask before traveling beyond these areas.

There is a shuttle bus service for those staying in Nhulunbuy who do not have access to a vehicle:

**Daily pick up: 7AM | Nhulunbuy to Yirrkala**

**Daily return: 7.30PM & 9.30PM | Yirrkala to Nhulunbuy**

## PARKING

Parking is available at the camp ground and near the Church. Please take note of signs when driving around the community as some areas may be closed to vehicles.

## LAUNDRY

There is one washing machine located at the camp ground.

## CATERING

All meals will be served at the Festival Hub. On Friday night there is a BBQ dinner at the Dadaynga Stage. Please help us keep everything tidy and clean by washing your own mug and using your water bottle.

There is a Woolworths and pharmacy in Nhulunbuy at Endeavour Square. Woolworths opening hours: 8am – 8pm everyday.

There is an ATM at the Yirrkala shop, however it is often out of order. There are several ATM's in the shopping precinct in Nhulunbuy and cash out is available at Woolworths.

## VISITORS

As a festival delegate you have a permit to be in this country. Please report any visitors who are not involved with the festival to Sarah. Please note that this is Yolngu Country.

## COMMUNITY MINDFULNESS

Please be aware that local business and school activities continue their usual hours during the festival. Please be respectful of these work spaces. Please direct all enquiries to Festival crew only.

## SCHOOL WORKSHOP ROOM

The school has allowed us to use their Galtha Room for workshops throughout the week. Except for walking to and from this space, please do not wander around the school.

## IMPORTANT

No alcohol or illegal drugs are permitted at the festival or to be brought into the community of Yirkala.

### CAMP AREA

Please do not smoke in or around the Banana Farm under any circumstances. The grass in this area is highly flammable. Please smoke only in the designated area.

### GENERAL AREA

We have provided you with a designated smoking area. Please only use this space to smoke and ensure all butts are put in the ash trays that are provided.

## MEDICAL

There is a First Aid Kit at the Church. Please find a crew member should you require medical attention.

The Yirkala Clinic is located just up the hill from the church. Clinic is open from 9am – 4pm Monday to Friday (see map) The number for the clinic is 8987 2650.

## SAFETY

While in the community, please always walk with a companion. This is both a cultural requirement and safety precaution.

Take care when walking down to beaches and around the community, particularly from dusk to early morning as the bush is home to Buffalo. There are crocodiles in the water around Yirkala and Nhulunbuy. Please be careful when at the beach or near the water and do not swim.

Always ask before exploring or walking around.

## WEATHER

September in the Top End is hot and sticky 24/7. Please take precautions to make sure you are hydrated throughout the day. Water bottles will be provided when you register and you will be able to refill these at the Church.

## INDEMNITY RELEASE FORM

All delegates are to sign the Indemnity Release Form upon Festival registration that will state the following:

## YIRRKALA

Traditional Owners of Yirrkala welcome you to the community and ask that you respect its residents and customs.

You must stick to roads when walking around the community. Walking elsewhere might mean you end up trespassing on sacred space or private areas. Special ceremony areas are restricted. Always ask before exploring or walking around. While in the community, please always walk with a companion. This is both a cultural requirement and safety precaution.

Please wear loose skirts, dresses or trousers that at least reach the knee and make sure your legs are covered when you are sitting down.

Do NOT photograph or enter residential areas of the community without invitation.

Do NOT bring drugs or alcohol to Yirrkala.

## FILMING & PHOTOGRAPHY

Delegates are permitted to film and photograph programmed events at the Festival. Please share these with IRCA for promotional purposes. Make sure you have signed your Media Release Form when you register. This covers all photography, video and the festival documentary for IRCA to use for promotional purposes and broadcast.

This is a place for all Festival delegates to introduce themselves. We will also have keynote speakers address all delegates.

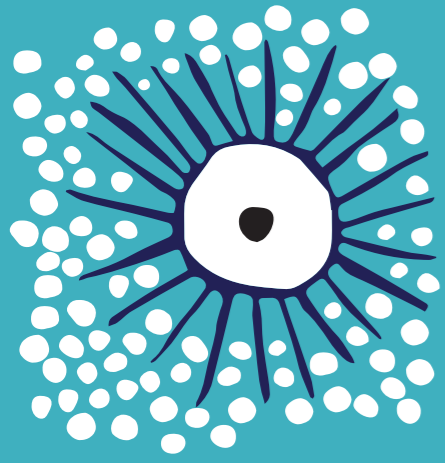

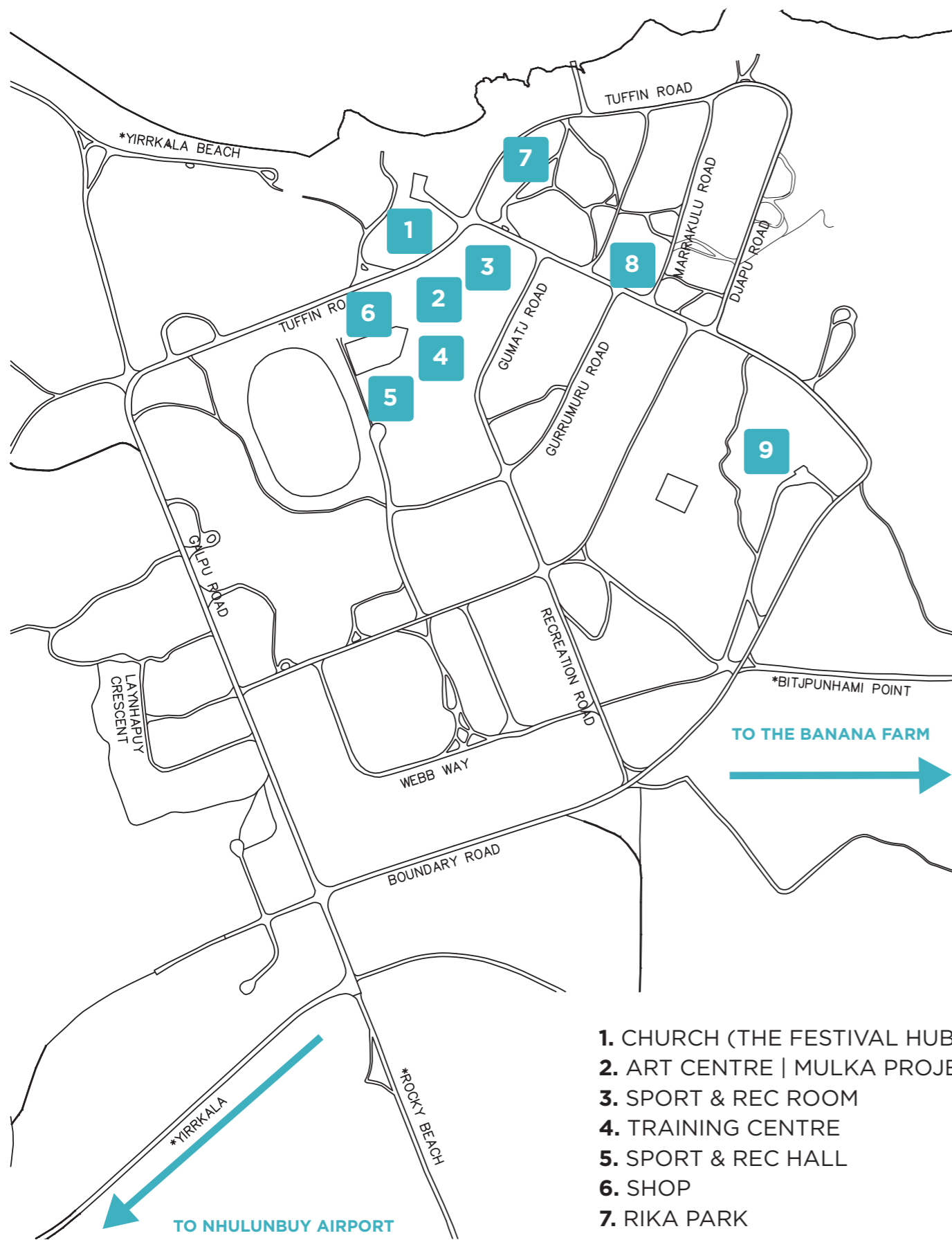

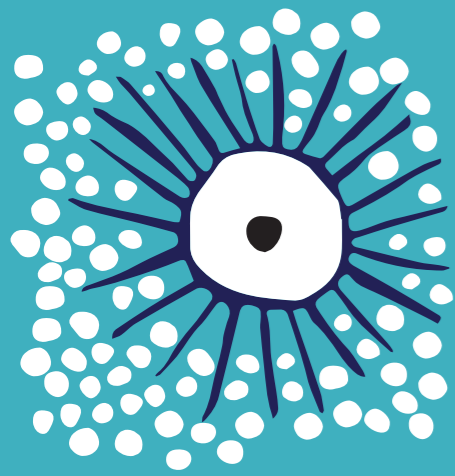

# about yirrkala

## FESTIVAL PARTNERS

Yirrkala is on the east coast of the Gove peninsula in north-east Arnhem Land, 18km south of Nhulunbuy, approximately 700km east of Darwin. Many people live intermittently between Yirrkala and surrounding homelands. At the 2011 census, Yirrkala and its surrounds had a population of 843, of which 649 were Indigenous (76 per cent). Yolngu Matha is the main language in Yirrkala, but there are different dialects. The Rirratjingu Clan are the traditional owners of Yirrkala.

The Yirrkala community became well known in 1963, when landowners sent a bark petition to the Australian Government to protest against the Prime Minister's announcement that a section of their land would be sold for bauxite mining. Although the petition itself was unsuccessful, in the sense that the bauxite mining at Nhulunbuy went ahead as planned, it prompted a government report recommending payment of compensation, protection of sacred sites, creation of a permanent parliamentary standing committee to scrutinise developments at Yirrkala, and also acknowledged the Indigenous people's moral right to their lands. The Bark Petition is on display in the Parliament House in Canberra.

Yirrkala is home to a number of leading Indigenous artists, whose traditional Aboriginal art can be found in art galleries around the world, and whose work frequently wins awards. Their work is available from the local community controlled art centre, the Buku-Larrnggay Mulka Centre.

The East Arnhem Shire Council provides local government in Yirrkala, which is in the Shire's Gumurr Miwatj Ward. The Shire consults community members through the Local Board of 12 locally elected community members, the Yirrkala Mala Leaders Association. The Northern Land Council, based in Darwin and with a regional office in Nhulunbuy, is the land council to the community. It is responsible for matters under the Aboriginal Land Rights (Northern Territory) Act 1976.

# about buku art centre



Buku-Larrnggay – “the feeling on your face as it is struck by the first rays of the sun (i.e. facing East)”

Buku-Larrnggay Mulka Centre is the Indigenous community controlled art centre of Northeast Arnhem Land located in Yirrkala, a small Aboriginal community, approximately 700km east of Darwin. Our primarily Yolngu (Aboriginal) staff of around twenty services Yirrkala and the approximately twenty-five homeland centres in a radius of 200km.

# about the mulka project

“The name ‘Mulka’ means a sacred but public ceremony, and, to hold or protect. The mission is to sustain and protect Yolngu cultural knowledge in Northeast Arnhem Land under the leadership of community members.” The Mulka production house and archive is managed by Yolngu law, governance and culture. Indigenous Remote Communications Association (IRCA) was established in 2001 as the peak body for remote Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander media and communications. Until mid 2016, it represented 150 Remote Indigenous Broadcasting Services (RIBS) across Australia, supported by eight Remote Indigenous Media Organisations (RIMOs), plus other non-RIBS and aspirant remote media groups. From July 2016, IRCA is now moving into a transition phase of becoming the national peak body representing the remote, regional and urban broadcasting, media and communications industry.

IRCA considers Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander managed media and communications an essential service in Indigenous communities, providing access to relevant media and information services, supporting health and wellbeing, enhancing skills and employment, and social and economic development. Further, IRCA recognises that media practice has an historical and proven role in the maintenance of language and culture, self-representation, community development and cultural safety.

IRCA is committed to providing tools, networks and resources to support Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander media organisations to build their capacity and business models, as well as to help Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander broadcasters, media producers and practitioners, journalists, technicians and managers build their skills, profile and capability.

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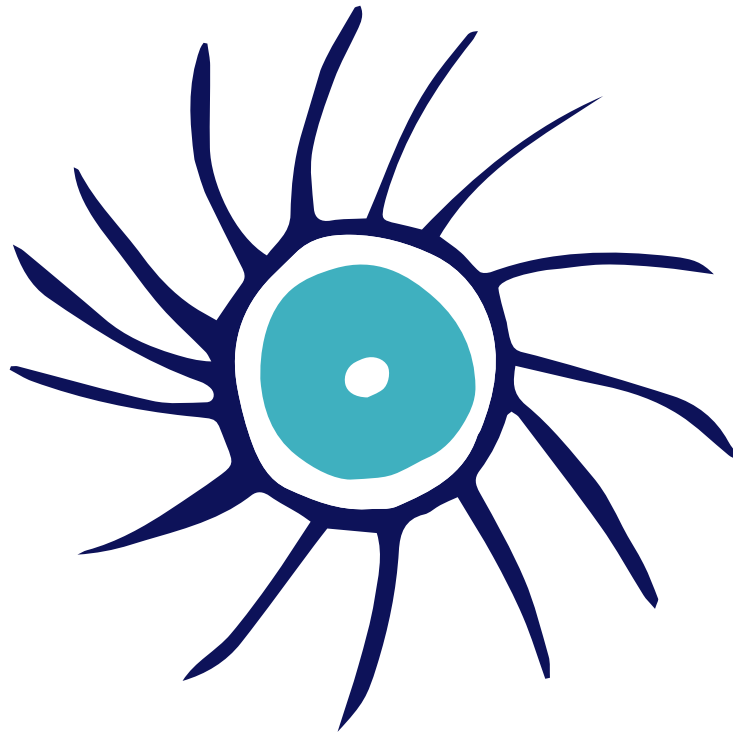
